Auction Houses

Auction Houses will accept your items to sell and often charge a consignment fee or premium. This is a good way to divest of quality objects as auction houses are, by definition, agents for the seller. They aim to get the highest price possible, meaning there's a lot more upside potential but also more risk if for some reason the piece doesn't sell, since sellers usually pay the auction houses a commission for their work.

- **Christie's -** was founded in 1766 as a world-leading art and luxury business. They have a physical presence in 46 countries. They have online-only auctions as well as bespoke Private Sales.
- **Doyle Auction and Appraisal services -** Will meet with individuals and discuss the appraisal of estates, collections, or single items and subsequent sale in their New York salesroom to an international client base.
- **Sotheby's -** was established in 1744 as a premier destination for art and luxury. Sotheby's promotes access to and ownership of exceptional art and luxury objects through auctions and buy-now channels.
- Weschler's Auctioneers & Appraisers-Weschler's has been an auction and appraisal firm in the Washington DC Metropolitan area for more than 130 years. They hold over 60 auctions per year with a range of categories. Art

One way to resell art is to contact the gallery you originally purchased the art from, as they are familiar with their artists' collector bases, as well as the institutions that my interested in an artist's work. If a gallery owner is reluctant to help resell it, an auction house is a good option.

Books

There are a few ways to sell rare books. Firstly, many **small bookstores** may be interested in your item, but this option may require a lot of work as you will need to visit them in person. You might also find that you don't get the right price as the bookshop will be looking to sell it on to make a profit. Secondly, **auction houses** are a great way to reach a number of buyers, and with the right catalog advert, you can make a good profit here. It is recommended that you use an auction house that has an online presence in order to market your book to as wide an audience as possible. There is also a number of **websites** that will help you to **sell a rare** or **old book**.

- Book Scouter-BookScouter.com is a great option if your rare book has an <u>ISBN number</u>. Simply enter the
 number and receive offers from over 30 buyback vendors, allowing you to find the vendor ready to buy your

Exchange with Neighbors

You can gift your unwanted items to a neighbor! By gifting your items you are doing your part to prevent items in working/usable condition from going into landfills! If you are interested in searching for no-cost items to exchange, gift, or request in your community use the following resources.

- Buy Nothing- this is an online community and is available via an app on Android and Apple phones or Facebook. Those interested in becoming a member can do so by joining a local community BuyNothing Facebook group by searching for a local neighborhood. Many of these groups have a defined boundary for sharing that goes on within the group. You do not need to have a Facebook page if you download the app.
- **Freecycle-**The Freecycle Network is made up of more than 5,000 local groups. It's a grassroots and entirely nonprofit movement of people who are giving (and getting) stuff for free in their own towns and keeping good stuff out of landfills. Membership is free, and everything posted must be free, legal and appropriate for all ages.
